




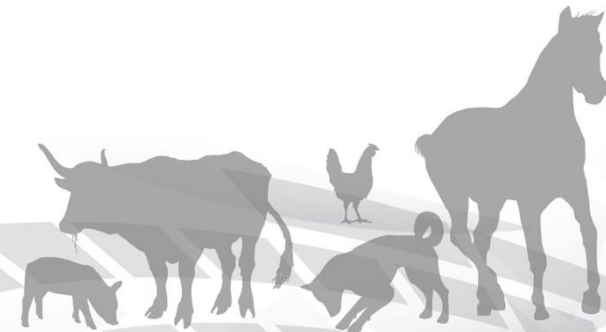

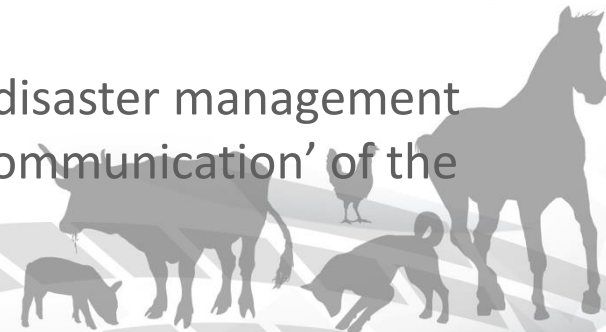
OIE guidelines on DMRR: training

- 
- Training and education are necessary to prepare Veterinary Services to execute their responsibilities during disasters.
 - Technical training is essential, and should be supplemented with training on organisational and operational aspects of disaster management, including inter-agency (inter-ministry) and inter-sectoral collaboration.
 - Disaster management training should be included in veterinary education and in training courses for private-sector stakeholders.




OIE guidelines on DMRR: communication

- 
- Effective communication is essential throughout the DMC. There must be effective communication both within the Veterinary Services and between Veterinary Services and other stakeholders, i.e. other government departments, non-government stakeholders and the public.
 - Communication plans should suggest alternative pathways for communication as telephone or electricity supply may fail.
 - Veterinary Services should consider developing pre-scripted communications that can be modified for use in the preparedness and response phases.
 - Veterinary Services are encouraged to incorporate disaster management communications in accordance with Chapter 3.3 'Communication' of the Terrestrial Code.

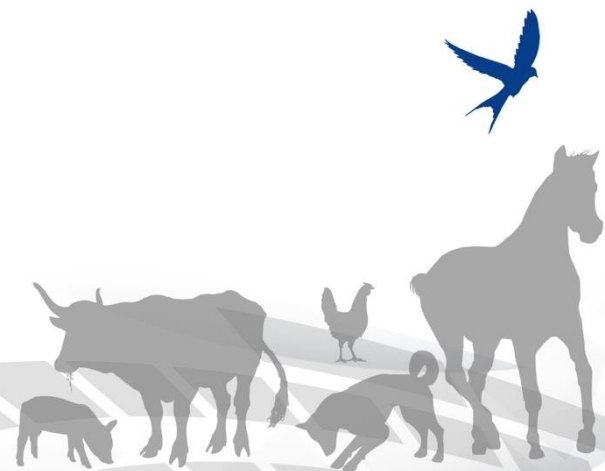

To be coherently incorporated in the DMC with dedicated space and dignity, resources, and engagement

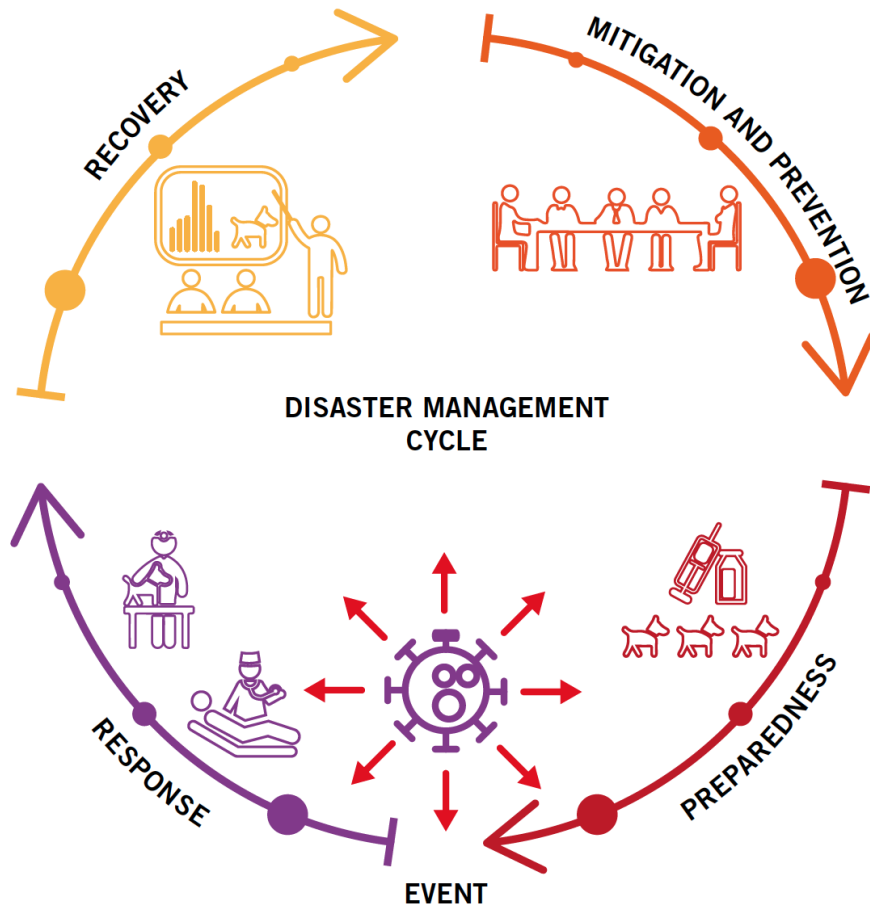


Figure 1. Phases of the Disaster Management Cycle
